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# PRINCIPAL MESSAGE

VET Course confirmations are still underway and students are being informed as soon as possible. Many courses are full, and some are oversubscribed so not all will be successful. If you do not get into your VET course you will need to replace the elective with another Thursday Period 3 & 4 subject. Please see your house team for support with this. **IMPORTANT:** As VET courses do not start until Feb 10th 2022, in Headstart there will be NO VET CLASSES, but an information session in Period 3 is being organised and details will be posted on Compass shortly. Parent approval will be required which will exempt your student from Period 4 or you can nominate that they can be allocated private study at school.

Once ATARs are released students have until 20 December (4pm) to change Uni course preferences via their VTAC account. Help is available through your Uni or by talking to the Senior School team on Thurs. 16th December.

You can only receive one offer per round and you can change your preferences between each round. If you get an offer, the general advice is to accept it!
