

MAKING THE MOST OF THE MORRISBY

Over terms 1 & 2 all year 9 students have started or completed their online Morrisby Career Profiling. It is an innovative online assessment which identifies a student's strengths and builds a comprehensive personal profile, raising self-awareness. After setting up an account, which we did together in class, they have lifetime access to information about apprenticeships, colleges, university courses and potential careers, including salary expectations and different routes to employment.

In week one next term every student who has completed their profiling will have a one on one session with a dedicated career practitioner to unpack their individual results and make sense of what it means for them. Perfect timing for Year 10 subject selection!

What can parents & guardians do?

Please encourage your young person to complete their profiling which can be done from home (Kerry can reset passwords if they have been forgotten). You are welcome to attend your students one-on-one session and discuss the results! Data shows that parents are the biggest influences on student pathways.

YOUR STUDENT & UNIVERSITY

Term 3 is the window when year 12s will create accounts and submit university preferences. It is also the time when students can apply for SEAS - Special Entry Access Scheme - to add a layer over their ATAR helping their chances of getting in.

There will be lunch time sessions, webinars and one-on-ones available to cover all of this and what is needed, but as always please reach out to Kerry Cheeseman anytime for anything Uni and SEAS related.

Many great initiatives have been undertaken this term by our passionate Sustainability team.





EXCURSION TO THE WARRNAMBOOL COMMUNITY GARDEN

Staff and students are encouraged to choose to recycle responsibly to reduce our school's waste output.

THE SCHOOL FOR STUDENT LEADERSHIP


